The Women's Business Center at Community First Fund Hosts Free Seminar
Attendees will learn about opportunities to work with the state

(York ,PA)...The Women's Business Center at Community First Fund is hosting "Doing Business with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania," Tuesday, May 27, 2008 from 9:00 am to 12:00 pm at the York City Department of Economic Development Office, located at 49 East Market Street. The seminar, held in conjunction with the PA Department of General Services and the Bureau of Minority and Women's Business Opportunities, will cover the following topics: discovering whether the state buys what you sell, learning how state government purchases goods and services, knowing where to find state business opportunities, exploring government programs to help small businesses and finding out about certification for minority – and woman-owned business. Community First Fund is a non-profit economic development organization that provides loan capital, business training, and one-on-one counseling to entrepreneurs of all sizes, affordable housing and commercial real estate developers, and community groups in under-served communities. Community First Fund's impact is felt throughout the 13 counties in central Pennsylvania that it serves as evidenced by the more than 650 loans that the organization has disbursed since inception, totaling nearly \$20 million.

The organization currently operates offices in Harrisburg, Lancaster, Reading, and York. Community First Fund is committed to developing creative ways to foster economic improvement in distressed communities. "Residents of under-served communities have ideas for viable businesses. For one reason or another, they may not have had the opportunity that would put them in a position to open their own business," said Dan Betancourt, President and CEO of Community First. "If we can help those individuals succeed, we help that person, their families and their neighborhoods. That's the work we want to accomplish."

The Women's Business Center and Community First Fund both have funds to provide loan capital to start-up and existing businesses. Additional funding to assist small minority- and women-owned contractors, who do not have access to lines of credit or other small business loans from traditional sources, is available from the newly created The Pennsylvania Business Opportunity Fund (BOF). Loans from the BOF will be administered by Community First Fund which partnered with the Department of General Services and the Department of Community and Economic Development to create the program.
